Research Questions

Are there Shared
 Representations in Archival
 Material Presented Online?

 Why is "Taking Part" in these Representations and Primary Source Research so Difficult?



Research Questions

- How to users make sense of archival surrogates?
- How to researchers use surrogates to help solve problems using primary sources?
- What design features do researchers use? And how well do they use them?
- What functionalities do users want to assist them in their work



Purpose

- Understanding more about use of archival materials
 - Search patterns and strategies of researchers using primary sources
 - How people think about solving primary source research problems
 - Identification of optimal search strategies
- Usability
 - Usability concerns the interface design, the content, and the functionalities of the system



Methodology

- Experimental design
 - Laboratory Setting
- Pre-test questionnaire
 - Demographic data
 - Library experience
 - Archival experience
 - Computer skills (self-rated)
- Usability Test
- Post-test interview



Participants

- Four groups
 - Undergraduates
 - Experienced archival researchers
 - Genealogists
 - Academic reference librarians
- Compensated \$25 per experiment
- Approved by the UM Institutional Review Board

 - Library of Congress, OCLC
 - Library of Congress, RLG

- EAD Sites
 - Online Archive of New Mexico
 - Bentley Historical Library



Four Usability Tests

- Each builds on the other to understand different dimensions of how researchers utilize and make sense of archival representations
 - Static MARC records
 - Searching online catalogs
 - EAD finding aids
 - Online catalogs to EAD finding aids

Archival knowledge

Searching skills

Usability features



Piloting the Usability Tests

- Assessing the feasibility of the questions
- Refining the questions
- Making sure the questions tested what we intended
- Timing
- Managing the level of difficulty



Data Capture

- Videotape
 - Audio
 - Video
- Keystroke capture
 - Camtasia (also does back up audio capture)
- Researcher notes



Static MARC Records

- Users are presented with 2-5 screens with archival MARC records from different online catalogs and asked a series of questions
 - Focus: whether or not any of the records on the screens represented the same underlying collection
- How much do users understand about archival MARC records?
- Eliminates searching from the equation
- Undergraduates and Expert Archival Researchers



Static MARC Records Tests

- Archival knowledge
 - Ability to recognize key information elements
 - Author
 - Title
 - Understanding of key information elements
 - Dealing with inconsistencies between records
- Usability
 - Placement of information
 - Presentation of data elements



EAD Finding Aids

- Undergraduates and Academic Reference Librarians
- Presented with a series of scenarios / tasks in two interfaces
- Tasks based on interviews and observations with researchers.
- Task goals include:
 - Filling out a call slip
 - Utilizing various search delimiters
 - Generating terms for subject searches
 - Selecting / identifying suitable collections to answer the question
 - Identifying archival information
 - Linking to digitized materials attached to finding aids

Rock and Roll Tests

- Archival Knowledge
 - Knowledge of information in Finding Aids
 - Knowledge of the Finding Aids structure
 - Ability to distinguish between context and content
- Searching Skills
 - Familiarity with simple and Boolean Searching
 - Ability to use delimiters
 - Knowledge of search strategies such as synonym generation, use of controlled vocabulary
 - Exhaustive search for "everything"
- Usability
 - Ability to use left / right frames
 - Ability to identify searching and navigational options at all points
 - Supportive of working memory




Rock & Roll: Searching (1)

Undergraduates

- Types of search
 - 5 started with simple search
 - 7 used Boolean search at least once
 - 4 used only simple search
- Search terms
 - Detroit, Detroit music,
 Detroit and
 Entertainment, Music,
 Rock, Rock and Roll,
 Rock and Roll in Detroit,
 Rock and Roll history

- Types of search
 - All started with Boolean search
 - 1 used simple search
- Search terms
 - Detroit, music, Motown, Rock, Roll, Rock and Roll
 - Subject headings
 - Rock music Michigan
 - Music Michigan --Detroit






Terrazas Photograph Tests

- Archival knowledge
 - Deep web: What happens when people search for someone who is not named as the author or whose name appears in the title
 - Ability to find digital documents linked to the finding aid
 - Known item search



- Searching skills
 - Use of delimiters
 - Understanding of how browser functions can be used in conjunction with EAD sites
 - Use of find function in browser helps search
- Usability
 - Navigation of the finding aid
 - Ability to expand / collapse left frame
 - How much scrolling users will do







Terrazas: Time, Completeness & Correctness

Undergraduates (n=11)

- Time
 - Average time to completion
 - Range
- 5 completed the task

Librarians (n=9)

- Time
 - Average time to completion
 - Range
- All completed the task



Findings: Experts and Novices

- Use of classic search strategies
 - Synonym generation
 - Use of official subject headings
- Use of delimiters
- Differences in known item and total recall searches



Findings

- Shared representations:
 - Archival knowledge
 - Ability to distinguish between content and contextual information
 - Nature of authorship
 - Terminology



Taking part:

- Searching
 - Low use of delimiters
- Navigating
 - Browse / Search
- Usability
 - Attention
 - Navigation



Conclusions

- Shared representations
 - Implicit meanings and archival paradigms exist in digital archives
- Taking part
 - Researchers have little opportunity to take part in the representations and own them
- Next generation tools
