Spring 2016 Application for 2016-2017 Course

The high cost of commercial print textbooks is a major concern for both students and their parents. With the available of reusable digital course content, known as Open Educational Resources (OERs), teachers are able to offer high quality course content at free or low cost to students. At the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, teachers wishing to redevelop their courses to make use of OERs can get support from the UNC Library and the Center for Faculty Excellence. Library liaisons are available to help instructors locate quality OER materials relevant to their classes, and the Center for Faculty Excellence provides training in re-envisioning and improving your course through the use of new materials (as well as through appropriate teaching techniques).

Utilizing grant funding to develop new methods of scholarly communications, the University of North Carolina is able to provide a limited number of stipends to help fund instructors wishing to incorporate existing OERs into their course content, or to create new OER materials for their courses.

We invite you to engage in this transformation to high quality freely available course content through a competitive grant process that will award stipends of \$500 to faculty teaching a course of under 50 students and \$1000 to faculty teaching a course with 50 or more students, who submit successful proposals outlining efforts to adopt a new curricular resource strategy. There is a \$5,000 pool of funding for this grant cycle.

Selection Criteria

Proposals will be reviewed by representatives of the University Libraries, Center for Faculty Excellence, and selected faculty members. Grants will be awarded on the basis of:

- Strength of application in response to questions
- Potential savings to UNC students
- Sustainability and applicability of the developed course materials for future course offerings
- Implementation completed and course materials used in academic year 2016-2017.
